Universal Declaration of Human Rights

<p>Article 1 Everyone is born free and equal in dignity and with rights.</p>	<p>Article 11 Everyone is to be presumed innocent until proven guilty in a fair trial. No one should be charged with a criminal offence for an act which wasn't an offence at the time the act was done.</p>	<p>Article 21 You have the right to take part in the government of your country.</p>
<p>Article 2 You should never be discriminated against for any reason. Rights belong to all people, whatever our differences.</p>	<p>Article 12 No-one has the right to intrude in your private life or interfere with your home and family without good reason. No-one has the right to attack your good name without reason.</p>	<p>Article 22 As a member of society, you have a right to social security.</p>
<p>Article 3 Everyone has the rights to life, liberty and security.</p>	<p>Article 13 You have the right to freedom of movement within your country. Everyone has the right to leave a country and to return home.</p>	<p>Article 23 You have the right to work, to good working conditions, to equal pay for equal work and to form and join unions.</p>
<p>Article 4 No-one shall be held in slavery or servitude.</p>	<p>Article 14 You have the right to seek and to enjoy asylum from persecution in other countries. You may not invoke this right if fleeing just laws in your own country.</p>	<p>Article 24 You have the right to rest and leisure.</p>
<p>Article 5 No-one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment.</p>	<p>Article 15 You have the right to a nationality.</p>	<p>Article 25 You have the right to a decent life, including enough food, clothing, housing, medical care and social services.</p>
<p>Article 6 You have the right to be treated as a person in the eyes of the law.</p>	<p>Article 16 You have the right to marry and to raise a family. Men and women have the same rights</p>	<p>Article 26 You have the right to an education.</p>

Article 7 You have the right to be treated by the law in the same way as everyone else. Everyone has a right to protection against violations of their human rights.	Article 17 You have the right to own property and it cannot randomly be taken away from you.	Article 27 No-one may stop you from participating in the cultural life of your community.
Article 8 If your rights under law are violated, you have the right to see justice done in a court or tribunal.	Article 18 You have the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion and to peacefully express those beliefs in teaching, practice and worship.	Article 28 You have the right to live in the kind of world where your rights and freedoms are respected.
Article 9 No-one shall be subject to arbitrary arrest, detention or exile.	Article 19 You have the right to freedom of opinion and expression.	Article 29 We all have a responsibility to the people around us and should protect their rights and freedoms.
Article 10 You have the right to a fair and public trial by an independent and impartial tribunal.	Article 20 You have the right to freedom of peaceful assembly and association.	Article 30 There is nothing in this declaration that justifies any person or country taking away the rights to which we are all entitled.

What law is broken?

Scenario	Discrimination Law Broken
An employee is off work on maternity leave and the employer fails to contact her about internal promotions in the business.	
A lady who uses a wheelchair can't get around the clothes rails in a cramped shop.	
A female member of staff is constantly overlooked for staff development training opportunities.	
A homosexual couple are told they can't stay in a B&B which is run by a Christian family.	
A 64 year old man is told he must retire on his next birthday.	
A landlord refuses to allow a Muslim family to rent his house.	
An employer makes inappropriate sexual comments to a member of staff.	
A member of the Travelling Community can't get help filling out a form in the Social Security Office.	
An employee wants to go to part-time hours, but the employer says they can't accommodate their requests.	
A man is being paid more than a woman for doing similar work in a company.	
An employee believes he has not been promoted because of his sexual orientation. His boss has made many homophobic comments in work.	
An employee is dismissed after she reported a colleague for bullying in the workplace.	
A Slovakian employee has their hours reduced to two days a week without their consent while a part-time worker has had their hours increased.
