



Special Consideration for GCSE, AS and A level

**Background information accompanying statistical release for
Summer 2019 Examination Series – Northern Ireland**

Information about the statistics

Purpose

This release presents figures on the number of special consideration requests for GCSE, AS and A levels submitted by centres¹ to awarding organisations for examinations and non-timetabled assessments sat in summer 2019.

Geographical coverage

This report presents data on special consideration in Northern Ireland. Five awarding organisations offer GCSE and A level qualifications in Northern Ireland:

- AQA Education (AQA)
- Council for the Curriculum, Examinations and Assessment (CCEA)
- Oxford Cambridge and RSA Examinations (OCR)
- Pearson Education Ltd. (Pearson)
- WJEC-CBAC Ltd. (WJEC)²

These five awarding organisations are members of the Joint Council for Qualifications (JCQ) which issues regulations, instructions and guidance on examination conduct and administration, including the appeals process.

Description

The qualifications covered in this release are regulated by CCEA Regulation. CCEA Regulation [publishes conditions](#) that set out the requirements the awarding organisations it regulates have to meet. These conditions state that an awarding organisation must have in place clear arrangements for Special Consideration for candidates in relation to qualifications which it makes available. In this release special consideration refers to a post-examination adjustment to a candidate's mark or grade to reflect temporary illness or injury, or some other event outside their control, which has had, or is reasonably likely to have had, a material effect on their ability to take an assessment or demonstrate their level of attainment in an assessment.

A special consideration request relate to a single request for a candidate sitting a specific unit or component in an examination. In this release, individual applications refer to an application from one candidate which can encompass either one or more units for that candidate. The Joint Council for Qualifications (JCQ) provides a [guide](#) for applying Special

Consideration for GCSEs, AS and A levels and highlights the types of special consideration which include:

- extra marks for a candidate whose examination performance is affected by temporary illness, injury or unforeseen incident;
- awarding a qualification even though the candidate has not completed all the assessments that would normally be required.

Adjustments reported in this release may be given to candidates who were present for an assessment but disadvantaged due to temporary injury, illness, indisposition or other unforeseen incident occurring immediately before or during the assessment period. JCQ's procedures allow for adjustments to a candidate's mark of up to 5% of the maximum raw mark available for a unit/component.

Data source

Awarding organisations submit data to Ofqual for GCSEs, AS and A levels that they award. Ofqual processes the data returns and shares them with CCEA Regulation. 2017 was the first year Ofqual collected data at candidate level and by subject for special consideration requests.. For this reason, candidate level data tables include data from 2017 only.

From 2016 onwards, the number of non-timetabled assessments have been reported along with the number of scripts marked.

Data for AS and A level have been combined in this release. To aid comparison with previous years withdrawn requests are listed under the total number of requests. Withdrawn requests refer to applications that an awarding organisation withdraws and requests the centre to reapply, at which point it is treated as a new application. In 2019, only 5 of the 54,450 requests were withdrawn.

Limitations

There is potential for error in the information provided by awarding organisations, therefore CCEA Regulation cannot guarantee that the information received from awarding organisations is correct. Ofqual compares the data over time and checks for systematic issues. Summary data are sent back to awarding organisations for checking and confirmation.

Revisions

Once published, data are not usually subject to revision, although subsequent releases may be revised to insert late data or to correct an error.

Confidentiality and rounding

To ensure confidentiality of the accompanying data, all figures have been rounded to the nearest 5. If the value is less than 3 (1 or 2), it is represented as 0~ and 0 represents zero values.

Total values of rows or columns are calculated using unrounded figures; the sum of rounded figures may differ from the total reported.

All percentages are rounded to the nearest whole number, except where smaller magnitudes are needed for meaningful interpretation. As a result of rounded figures, the percentages (calculated on actual figures) shown in tables may not necessarily add up to 100.

Status

These statistics are classified as Official Statistics.
